

A regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held Wednesday, January 24, 2024, at 7:30 p.m. in the aldermanic chamber.

President Lori Wilshire presided; City Clerk Dan Healey recorded.

Prayer was offered by City Clerk Dan Healey; Alderman-at-Large Ben Clemons led in the Pledge to the Flag.

Let's start the meeting by taking a roll call attendance.

The roll call was taken with 13 members of the Board of Aldermen present: Alderman Moran, Alderman Thibodeau, Alderman Gouveia, Alderman Lopez, Alderman Sullivan, Alderman Clemons, Alderman Sennott, Alderman Jette, Alderman Thibeault, Alderman Klee, Alderman Dowd, Alderwoman Kelly, Alderman Wilshire.

Alderman O'Brien and Alderwoman Timmons were recorded absent.

Mayor James W. Donchess, Corporation Counsel Steve Bolton were also in attendance.

REMARKS BY THE MAYOR

Mayor Donchess

Well first I wanted to thank City Clerk Dan Healey and his staff for running our NH Primary Election yesterday and did a very smooth, and ran things very smoothly, and did a very good job despite some obstacles. There were COVID related absences in various Wards which City Clerk Healey had to cover, find people for, and cover himself. So, again, they did a great job. I'd also like to thank all the poll workers who we know in each of our nine Wards they get up very, very early in the morning, work until late at night, count absentee ballots, and run the operation smoothly, fairly, cleanly as we always have here in Nashua. So I want to thank all the people involved.

Second, I wanted to mention the passing of Al Savage. I'm sure other people here knew him very well. Everything they say about him in the newspaper, all the good things are really true. I mean I knew Al for a lot of years and he died at age 95 but when he was a little younger and I was Mayor also, he ran a lot of youth sports leagues out of the Elk's organization. At that time, the Elk's always down on Daniel Webster Highway and he would hold around six banquets every year at which he would invite each of the young athletes along with their families. These would be held, I think, on a Wednesday night and just as a thank you for all of them becoming involved. I mean he just loved those kids and he gave everything he could to them and he really deserves all of the accolades that he has received since his passing. It's sad that ultimately, he did pass away but he was proceeded by his wife Marion, also very involved and a very dedicated public servant. They jointly received Citizen of the Year Award from the Chamber of Commerce some decades ago but it was a joint award both Al and Marion Savage. So I wanted to speak to his passing.

I also wanted to update you on the entire Board on the action taken by the Finance Committee tonight. The Finance Committee authorized a contract to enable a warming shelter beyond that is being provided by the Nashua Soup Kitchen and Shelter. A warming station is something that operates from the evening around 9 o'clock to 6:00 in the morning for anyone who is unhoused and wishes to get warm and have a place to go. The UU Church on Canal Street agreed to offer their space for this really as a donation. We have agreed to pay them around \$3,000 in their anticipated expenses relating to heat, light, and coffee, and other things that they will provide at that site. The contract that was authorized is with East Coast Evolution which is a service provider that is performing a similar service for warming shelters in Manchester and other communities across New Hampshire.

The funds are coming from the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund which Director Bagley testified before the Finance Committee totals right now about \$326,000. The amount that it will cost that it will cost to provide this service will be \$97,000 of that amount. I think it's important to note that we have this money or at least most of it because some years ago the Board of Aldermen at the suggestion of our Legal Department authorized the city to enter as a plaintiff in many of these opioid related lawsuits that have come across the country. As a result of being one of the main plaintiffs in that litigation, we receive a greater share of the opioid, the National Opioid Settlements, than we otherwise would if we were simply a receiver community. That money, and there were questions at the Finance Committee related to well what happens when the money runs out, that is possible but these settlements require that the various defendants in these cases, which include the manufacturers of the opioids - Perdue and other pharmaceutical companies - and in many cases distributors - those being the pharmacies and others. The settlements require that those defendants pay into this fund over a period of decades so there will be a continuing stream of funds. Now it may not be as much as we have now but there will be more money coming on a periodic basis as a result of those settlements. So I wanted to make that clear.

Thank our Legal Department for getting us involved in those lawsuits because it has yielded benefits for our community in the form of financial support for anti-opioid and anti-opioid efforts. With that Madam President, I will conclude.

RESPONSE TO REMARKS OF THE MAYOR

Alderman Lopez

With regard to the warming stations, do you know when those will be online?

Mayor Donchess

As soon as possible. I mean we did it on an emergency basis tonight so we can really start it right away.

Alderman Lopez

Are you aware whether those stations are participating in the point in time count?

Mayor Donchess

Director Bagley is nodding her head yes so the answer is yes.

Alderman Lopez

The point in time count is the annual count that we try to determine exactly how many people are unsheltered, or homeless, or whatever category in the city and that information is collaboratively collected across many, many organizations. It's a great night to make that announcement.

Mayor Donchess

I'd like to thank Director Bagley who was very involved, Megan Caron, Matt Sullivan, all of them were involved in sort of putting this together quickly. The point was made that maybe we should have done this earlier which is probably correct but now it has been done and I want to thank them for their efforts.

President Wilshire

I just want to echo what the Mayor said about Al Savage. He was a great guy. I went to a many a roast beef dinner at the Elk's Club with my kids when they were in sports. He was a wonderful guy. He'll be missed.

Alderman Moran

I know Director Sullivan noticed but he's not around today but she was on CNN last week asking mental health questions to Ron DeSantis. She was invited on by CNN and it was great to see her asking the policy questions of the candidate. I think she might have drove him out of New Hampshire.

Second too staying on complimenting my life partner, she was recently nominated and voted onto the Board of Alumni for Rivier. Tonight was supposed to be her first meeting but we had an emergency Finance Committee meeting and I had to be here to vote for an emergency shelter and she had to skip her first meeting but I'm sure she looks forward to the future ones.

More congratulations though but down to my colleague down to the right from Ward 4. Congratulations - licensed clinical mental health counselor Tom Lopez formerly from Board of Mental Health. Alderman Gouveia

Thank you, Madam President. I think there's a lot of people around the horseshoe. I've noticed Ward 1 has been in the news on Saturday night which is super, super unfortunate but I do just want to thank the Nashua PD for their speedy response in ensuring the neighborhoods were kept safe during all this. I'd like to stress the importance of the training and the amount of money we spend on training our Police Department. Although it might have seemed costly upfront in situations like what we saw Saturday night, Sunday morning. It's worth every penny and you can't really put a price tag on it.

On a more positive note, I would like to thank the New Hampshire Senate, the Health & Human Services Committee, for their positive recommendation of SB70 - I have the wrong Bill number, sorry, but it provides yearly optional cancer screening for firefighters all across the State so that's a big start. That will go to the Senate floor and then we'll hopefully make it through Senate Finance, and the House, and be signed by the Governor and our firefighters will be able to receive optional cancer screening. So that would be a very big step in the right direction for that industry.

Alderman Lopez

Some community events - on February 17th, there' will be a Noche Fuego event over at Soel Sisters. Anybody looking for a couple of Valentine's Day plans. It's a chance for a Spanish dinner, music, and dancing. So that should be something to look forward to on February 17th.

I wanted to thank all of our poll workers who worked long hours, especially considering the extra impact of the write-in campaign that was taking place. I want to thank everybody who put their time and effort into supporting their candidates. I met a couple of people who came up from New York to support theirs. I met a lot of neighbors and residents in Ward 4 who were passionate about their choices. Overall, I think we had a great turnout and I'd love to see that continue. I want to thank City Clerk Healey for organizing everybody and leading them in such a successful and very much closely watched endeavor because I don't think we've ever been quite this closely scrutinized given all of the tension between the Democratic National Convention and our local NH deserved its primary democrats. So I think there's a lot of scrutiny and a lot of attention to it and I think it was very well handled and very smoothly. So I'm very grateful to our staff.

I also want to recognize Fred Davis and Arthur Craffy who oversaw our event locally at Ledge Street School. Thank you very much.

Alderman Sullivan

Thank you. Kudos to City Clerk Healey for a very smooth primary day yesterday. As was mentioned earlier, Ward 9 went really well. It's great because I wasn't really quite sure what to expect on a primary day and I went mid-day and the traffic was steady. So that's good especially for folks that are there all day. As long as there is people coming in, it kind of moves the day along. So thank you to all the people that helped out not just in Ward 9 but across the city.

It's always great to go and vote and an impromptu Ward meeting breaks out. I should wear a hat and sunglasses next time but it's good to connect with voters and the public.

I also want to from what I know, you can fact check me on this, but I think there is about 13 promotions coming up on Sunday for Nashua Fire & Rescue over at I think it's at Nashua High North that's happening on Sunday. Congratulations to all of the folks from Nashua Fire & Rescue that are getting a nice promotion on Sunday. That's it.

Alderman Sennott

Thank you, Madam President. I certainly want to reiterate the comments and kudos to City Clerk Healey and to all our poll workers throughout Nashua and give special recognition to the folks over in Ward 7. Yesterday was the first election in about 6 years where I wasn't onsite from start to finish and so it was a little weird to just get up and leave the house at 6:15 and then go to work and then show up, vote, say a couple hellos, and leave. We got a new moderator in there and so I kind of went in apprehensively. That's sort of become my baby if you will but we went in during the evening rush. People were smiling, people were happy, things were moving smoothly so I certainly want to offer kudos to moderator Evelyn Lewis, our long-time clerk Judy Blachek, and our three Selectmen Lynn Laughton, Elizabeth Forney, and Dee Hogan. That's all I have.

Alderman Thibeault

Thank you, Madam Chair. I wasn't going to speak but since everybody's speaking about the election yesterday. Thank you to Dan, and everybody, all the poll workers at all the different polls. I went to Ward 8. I was probably there about a half hour. Overall, it was smooth but while I was there, like I said I wasn't there that long, I went out and spoke to one of the women holding a sign. She is a (inaudible) American and someone drove by and gave her the finger while I was there. So you know there was some of that going on yesterday. I also got an email today or instant message from a woman. I believe she was probably working in Ward 2 because that's where she's from. She's a 76-year old woman and someone went right up to her and started screaming at her. So those are the things that I just have problems with in the city. I don't care who you vote for. You can vote for whoever you want but I don't know why people can't be civil. If you don't like the sign, don't wave back. It's pretty simple, right? She was only trying to be nice and wave to people coming in. So I thought that part was awful and it's nothing that we can do here in the city. It's human behavior. I was a little disappointed in my time there but as far as the polls, they went smooth and I didn't hear of any complaints anywhere else in the city. Dan in the last few elections you've done a great job coming here in the last couple of years and hitting every note. So thank you for that and thank you to everybody that was involved to make sure it ran smoothly whether here or at the polls.

Alderman Klee

Thank you, Madam President. I, too, want to echo the thank yous to City Clerk Healey, as well as his staff, and all those who worked at the polls, as well as the voters that came out. I mean obviously the reason why we're here is for them to come out and vote and it is so important. You know I always want people to vote for the same person that I vote for but getting out to vote is the most important thing and this is just the beginning of the season. We'll have the primary I think it's in September and then in November we'll have the general election. So do some homework and be nice when you go out to the polls as Alderman Thibeault said. I, too, have experienced some nastiness and so on. This was the very first time I was not at the polls. I, for personal reasons, couldn't be at the polls this time around.

I also want to the passing of Mr. Savage, Al Savage. I received from probably one of his biggest fans, Mr. Grady contacted me and let me know that he had passed away. For those that do want to pay their respects on Friday between 4:00 and 7:00 at the Rochette Funeral Home there will be services and then the funeral mass will be at 9:30 am at St. Joseph's Worker Church on Saturday. The internment will follow at Woodlawn. So I just wanted to give that information but you go to the Rochette Funeral Home and you can see the obituary and so on.

We did a proclamation to both Al and Marion soon after she passed to pay our respects. It was equally to both of them. I have friends that have worked with Biddy Basketball and so on and he is responsible for our Biddy Basketball who just talked about how she would clean all the uniforms, and do all these things, and they'd have to go and pick them up, and so on but the kindest people that you can imagine. So he will be missed by our city. He truly is an ikon and I know we have a number of Mr. Nashua's but he is Mr. Sports Nashua, I guess you would want to call him.

Also prior to coming to the Finance meeting, I went to the Ward 4/Ward 3 I guess it Crime Watch at the Amherst Street School. Part of the conversation they talked a little bit at the beginning about some traffic issues and so on. One of the things that kind of stuck me that when I've talked to our public works about traffic is that when people are going through stop signs or you feel there is a need for a stop sign, etc. one of the things our Public Works can't just put up stop signs. They have to have a warrant. One of the reasons for doing that is that there have been accidents there or so on so our PD is very, very important when it comes that that and that was one of the questions that I asked them. Do you get a lot of reports and people tend to complain on Facebook and don't do those reports? So even if someone isn't coming out there, do those reports, get that information, contact the PD number if you feel that there's a particular intersection that's very hazardous. I just want to kind of get that out. It was just – it kind of hit me when we were talking of people complaining and say we need stop signs here. We, this body, does legislation for it but not until we get Public Works approval and so on. Thank you, Madam President.

Alderman Dowd

Just a shout out. My condolences to the Savage family.

Also, I'd like to give a shout out to Alderwoman Timmons who sat at the polls checking people in all day. It's probably why she's not able to be here this evening. When I went to vote, City Clerk Healey was at Ward 2 so I guess he was giving his oversight to a good Ward. So shout out to him as well. Thank you.

Alderwoman Kelly

It's funny I was about to give the same story. I'm really proud of the turn out in Ward 5. Clerk Healey was there when I was there so I got to hear a little bit of how his day was going and I appreciate all the work that you were doing keeping everything going so smoothly and the poll workers as well. It was a good turn out and I was glad to see it for sure.

I also wanted to thank the Finance Committee for coming in and doing the emergency funding. I know that the Soup Kitchen and Shelter and others in the community have been concerned about how we were going to get that warming station up.
