## **I. Public Comment**

### Mayor Donchess

Now we have a public comment. I just want to mention this. I understand that there may be people in favor and opposed to disc golf here to address the Board. Usually, we limit these remarks to things that are going to be acted on, but since it seems people are here, we will entertain the comments, but please try to stay brief. Your maximum is three minutes. We will

open the public comment. Any member of the public in the audience here wish to address the board just come up. So, all you have to do is come up to the microphone, state your name and address, and then tell us what you'd like us to hear.

Alex Maclean, City of Nashua Resident

Alex Maclean, 47 Williams Street. I'm here obviously in support of disc golf. We're very active, my family and I are very active in sports here within the city. My son plays for little league, Cal Ripken. My daughter plays for youth soccer, as well as other sports. And disc golf is definitely one of them. My kids love and enjoy it. They love talking to all the other kids about it.

Disc golf is and will be a great thing for the kids of this city to enjoy, to get outside and play and have fun. And it's great for children and adults of all ages. I actually ran into somebody throwing in Main Dunstable Fields the other day while I was doing the trash route. And I stopped and talked to him. He was an older gentleman that just started playing. He was super excited about it, and this is going to be great for the city. Just wanted to say thank you guys.

Mayor Donchess

Thank you very much. Anybody else in the chamber or in the auditorium here?

Denise Muccioli, City of Nashua Resident

Yes. I'd like to, I'd like to speak about disc golf, Denise M.

Mayor Donchess

Alright. We're going to take the people in the chamber first.

Denise Muccioli, City of Nashua Resident

Okay.

Mayor Donchess

Or the auditorium. So please just give us your name and address.

Richard Smart, City of Nashua Resident

Richard Smart, 159 Searles Road. Again, thank you for having us here. I'm obviously a proponent of Disc Golf. Just came here to let you know that disc golf is not dangerous. We are following all of the recommendations, both safety and otherwise. And there are a lot of things that this city does that doesn't bring benefit to every citizen of the city. There are things that happen in the city that only bring benefits to a subset of the city. This is one of those things. I am not a parent. I don't have children in the city. I am 100% behind the new middle school in Nashua because it's the best thing for our city. So, let's get behind this disc golf project and let's get behind it for our city. That's what it's about. This is what our city needs. So, thank you for the time. And I hope that we get to move this project forward again soon. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone else in the auditorium wish to address the board? Alright. On Zoom, anyone on Zoom wish to address the Board of Public Works?

Denise Muccioli, City of Nashua Resident

I do wish to address, Denise Muccioli, 6 Midhurst.

Mayor Donchess

Please go ahead.

Denise Muccioli, City of Nashua Resident

So, I understand, everybody's into this sport and it's a great outdoor activity and so forth. But what you're not hearing is the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services found several, they called them minor violations of impact of wetlands. How could this have slipped by you guys? Nobody applied for a wetland variance. I'm just really, really shocked that anybody walking that area in the trails can clearly see a brook running through it. So that's problem number one.

Here is a quote from the report: "disturbance of unnamed stream originating at East Dunstable Road observed including possible crossing with machinery without proper crossing device. Then there are tree roots ripped up adjacent to wetlands, improper crossing devices." I see that the silt socks and the straw came after myself and another woman put a report into the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. So, there are several impacts not only to the wetland, but to the wildlife that are diverse in that area. And those people that just spoke, they can say that it's what the city needs.

No, what this city needs is more natural habitat that's undisturbed that people can go in and observe wildlife, track wildlife. The kids across the street that walk, they come over in the trails and they can learn about wildlife. Also, a site plan was not filed. And I'm wondering why this Board saw fit that they didn't have to file a site plan. I do believe that they were supposed to file a site plan. And the site plan was not filed nor was posted, nor was the wetland variance applied for and that wasn't posted. So, by not posting those two things at Roby Park, you left the abutters in the dark until the last minute when they started cutting down tree after tree after tree.

I'd like to find out if the funds for Gove Environmental is coming from taxpayer dollars, and I'd like to get a scope of work, and I'd like to know the status of their report. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone else on zoom wish to address the board?

Laurie Ortolano, City of Nashua Resident

Yes. Laurie Ortolano, 41 Berkeley Street. I didn't know disc golf was on the agenda. I looked at the agenda and I didn't think this was a topic being covered today. Is it being covered?

Mayor Donchess

No, it's not.

Laurie Ortolano, City of Nashua Resident

Well, I don't know why everyone got to talk about it, but since they are, I'll join in, because I intended to cover it at the end. But it became an issue at the beginning. So, I think the people who are for it, I understand why. I think the process though that the city used to vet this was not correct. And we need to do a better job when we're going to change our parks, and particularly a park such as that, that has such high utilization and 50 acres of beautiful area, including wetlands. That before we make a major change, that there is plenty of dialogue that goes on with the citizens of that neighborhood and the community. And I just don't think it happened here.

I was one of those people that filed a report with the DES. And I didn't think it was right walking it. My husband and I walked it and didn't think it was right. We met people who were shocked at what was going on. Hearing some of the expert Board members say, I have a master gardener degree and I can tell you what this and that are all about. Well, not really. The DES did have a little different perspective. And there was no erosion mitigation going on when I was down there until I told them. I filed a report. Days later the erosion mitigation went up. I just think we don't do the best job when it comes to public relations to building consensus and we don't recognize the value of functional conflict.

We don't all have to conform to the same idea. We can disagree and we can vet things to come up with solutions that hopefully give some satisfaction to both sides. It can't always be done that way, but it certainly, there's no chance of it being done that way when you don't reach out to both sides. And I think this happened too quickly and was unvetted. I'm a big supporter of an overall Parks Group through the Board. I don't like the fact that a Greeley Park Advisory Committee was formed for Greeley Park. I think there should have been an overall Parks Advisory Committee formed that encircles all of our parks and allows the Conservation Commission to have a bigger voice, embedding what is going-

-with Parks and Rec. That's all I have to say. Thank you.

## II. Engineering Department

### A. Discussion: Changes to traffic patterns in the vicinity of the Franklin Street School

Mayor Donchess

We will go on to the other items on the agenda. Engineering Department, discussion regarding the Franklin Street School Project.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Sure, thank you, Mr. Mayor. Dan Hudson, City Engineer. I'm going to be very brief, turn it over, if it pleases the Board, to Alderman Dowd, who can speak to this more directly. This is a school related project that Engineering has been providing some support to the school department on.

Alderman Dowd

So, Franklin Street is one of the nine school projects we have going on right now. It's one of the ones that has critical timing, school opens up August 30<sup>th</sup>. And Franklin Street School has two floors of preschool, so we're talking like four- or five-year-old students. And the upper floor is a middle school, is an alternative school. So, we've been going back and forth for a few months on what is the best thing we can do relative to the safety of the students in many aspects.

It was determined, and we've involved all City Departments: Police, Fire, DPW. So, it was determined that the safest thing to do because of the way the traffic is around Franklin Street was to make the streets right around the school one way. The Board of Aldermen passed an ordinance on that. Normally we would send it here for opinion, but we were on such a time crunch because we have to get all of the work done on the street and the signs in place and get people used to it before school starts.

Franklin Street will be one way from Locust Street to Charles Street. And then Charles Street will be one way north to Terrace Street. Winter Street will be one way from Charles Street to Locust Street. And then part of Locust Street will be one way for the buses. Also, there will be limited parking only during school hours, so that there's no interference with the parents dropping off and the buses that are dropping off students.

And also, so that Fire and Police, if there's an emergency, won't be inhibited by any cars parked there, so they can get to the school quickly. Again, we have several young young students, so it was our paramount goal to make sure that we had the safest possible plan for that. Mr. Hudson is working on the street marking, which we're going to cover under the project. And they're also doing the signage that has to be put up to indicate the one way. So, I don't know if you have any questions.

Mayor Donchess

Questions or comments from Commissioners? Commissioner Moriarty.

Commissioner Moriarty

Just a comment, Alderman Dowd. I wouldn't be opposed to this, if it has already been vetted by our Engineer, who's the expert in the field. I would just make comment, in generality, that current trends in city planning opposed one-way streets. They found that it hurts the vibrancy of a downtown, and they have found it to be less safe because cars tend to go faster on one-way streets than two way. Now I know in this situation the street probably isn't wide enough for two cars, but I'm just saying that as a fact that the trend in city planning is to do away with one ways. That's all.

Alderman Dowd

We went through several iterations of plans, and this is the only way that you can protect the safety because some of the parents come up and they have a child in car seats on both sides of the car, open a door on the outside. And Franklin Street's not wide enough to allow that without the possibility of a young child being hit. And then people up to this day, come down Charles Street, there's a stop sign there. Guess what? 90% of them don't stop.

They come around very quickly. We almost had accidents the other day when we were there. It's critical to make Charles one way. And Winter Street, that's where we're going to be dropping off the handicap students. We think that that's the best plan going forward. And the buses will be over on Locust Street for drop off and pick up.

Mayor Donchess

Questions? Comments? Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

I know that there was some vision at some point for an off ramp from the Broad Street Parkway to Franklin Street and to have some additional flow of traffic to that end of the river. Have we basically abandoned that concept in deploying this?

Alderman Dowd

I would say at the moment, yes. There's no plan, no funding to do that. And there's numerous problems with undertaking that. And Franklin Street is such a narrow street. The only way that would work is if you made the entire length of Franklin Street one way to the Veterans Parkway and come in the other way. There's nothing in the plans on that anytime in the near future.

Commissioner Shea

Okay.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone? Alderman O'Brien.

Michael B. O'Brien, Sr., Aldermanic Liaison

Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I speak to the Board here as Chairman of the Committee of Infrastructure. Many of your questions, we had the same thing that we debated. We did look favorably upon this because the keyword is safety. This will be a school. It has to do with the children, as my Vice Chair Alderman Dowd brought up. I've taken my grandson to Mount Pleasant and the back of that building at times can be challenging, you know?

This is an attempt to avoid that, to make it as safe as possible for the students and the parents who will be dropping the children off. This is preschool age students. And the unfortunate thing is time is of the essence. So, we did kind of look at this and took a partial view of it, but it has met all the criteria that my committee had. So, I hope that you share the same opinion as the Committee of Infrastructure and support this. Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Donchess

Thank you. Any other questions? Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

And so, in doing this, the Loft 34 building still has two-way access, the bank still has two-way access.

Alderman Dowd

Yes.

Commissioner Shea

It's really the neighborhood that would not be able to exit that way, but they've got plenty of exits otherwise.

Alderman Dowd

Locust Street to Main Street is still two-way.

Commissioner Shea

Okay. Thank you.

Alderman Dowd

And they can use Green Street as well.

Commissioner Shea

Appreciate it.

Mayor Donchess

Commission Schoneman.

Commissioner Schoneman

Does the city own the parking lot that's adjacent to the school?

Alderman Dowd

No. We lease the lot. It's owned by the church and we're trying to lease more of the lot. That's where all the staff park.

Commissioner Schoneman

Okay.

Alderman Dowd

In that lot, it's a very large lot. The first part of the lot is used by Loft 34. The second part is used by the school.

Commissioner Schoneman

Okay. And is there school bus parking? Is that what I see or just school bus circulation in that parking lot.

Alderman Dowd

On Locust Street, the school buses will pull up, drop the students off on that side of the school. There's a door on that side, on Locust Street, empty the bus, the bus will take off next bus comes in.

Commissioner Schoneman

Okay.

Alderman Dowd

Same thing for pickup.

Commissioner Lemen

As a former Mount Pleasant parent, I saw what happened when we changed the traffic pattern. So, is there going to be, I assume the school will send mail out to the parents and all that stuff

Alderman Dowd

Yes.

Commissioner Lemen

-but is there going to be a strong Police presence the first few days of school?

Alderman Dowd

Yes, definitely. And also, by the way, a staff member meets every single car because these are four-year-olds. They have to go with them into the building.

Commissioner Lemen

Mm-hmm <affirmative>

Alderman Dowd

There's a massive safety concern and we've taken care of it.

Commissioner Lemen

Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone else? Commissioner Shea?

Commissioner Shea

I will say that I do have concerns about the impact on development potential and access to the Broad Street Parkway. Just to belabor that point. I would imagine that the neighborhood is generally in favor of this because it does prevent that. But it also prevents that that conversation from happening in earnest. I will support this today because I think ultimately, it's a decent plan and there's some give and take on it. We do lose some potential there. But I just wanted to voice that.

Alderman Dowd

Yes. I don't know if it's up for a vote for this committee because it's already-

Commissioner Shea

It's just information.

Alderman Dowd

-an ordinance that's been approved. All set?

Commissioner Shea

Yes.

Alderman Dowd

And just while I'm here, I support Alderman Comeau's Labine Field lighting. Ha.

[Group Laughter]

Alderman Dowd

Just want to give him that support. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

I wondered why he was here.

[Inaudible background chatter and more laughter]

Alderman Comeau

Just to hear you speak.

Michael B. O'Brien, Sr., Aldermanic Liaison

Everybody has a purpose, Mr. Mayor.

[Some light chuckles]

**B. MOTION:** Commissioner Lemen to approve the Sewer Service Permits and Fees as submitted.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

**C. MOTION:** Commissioner Shea to approve Pole License Petitions #21-1621, #21-1622.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

**D. MOTION:** Commissioner Moriarty to approve the construction contract for Siphon Rehabilitation with Insituform Technologies LLC of Chesterfield, MO in an amount of \$1,173,000. Funding will be through Department: 169 Wastewater; Fund: Bond; Activity: Sewer Infrastructure Improvements.

Mayor Donchess

Mr. Hudson.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Thank you, Mr. Mayor. During phase one of the capacity and management operation and maintenance program or our CMOM program, where we look at sewers. The siphons on eight locations we're looked at. These are siphons that go under waterways, multiple closed pipes ranging in size from 8 inch to 36 inch. And of the 22 that we looked at, 14 had some various issues that need to be addressed. Cracked pipes, erosion, even some holes, and that sort of thing. This contracts Insituform to do pipelining and make those various repairs.

Mayor Donchess

Discussion? All those in favor of the motion, say, aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

- E. MOTION:** Commissioner Schoneman to approve Change Order No. 1 to the 2022 Sewer Replacement Project with SUR Construction West, Inc. of Winchester, NH for an amount not-to-exceed \$500,000. Funding will be through Department: 169 Wastewater; Fund: Bond; Activity: Sewer Infrastructure Improvements.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Dan Hudson, City Engineer. SUR Construction West is currently making our sewer repairs throughout the city under our dig program. They're close to wrapping up their 2022 work. But we are embarking on significant CCTV work. There's two contracts through our CMOM Program, but also as well as a separate contract, which is recently approved. We anticipate finding problems as part of that, that will need to be addressed immediately. This change order therefore is to increase issuer's budget so that we're willing and able to quickly contract them to get them out to make those repairs when we find them.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone? All those in favor of the motion say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

- F. MOTION:** Commissioner Lemen to approve Change Order No. 2 for the Canal St Bridge Construction Repairs contract in an amount of \$34,000. Funding will be through Departments: 160 Admin/Engineering & 161 Street; Funds: Capital & Grant; Activities: Infrastructure Improvements & Highway Block Grant.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Excuse me. The Canal Street Bridge is currently being rehabbed. The issues with the bridge are underneath and there's some issues with the concrete, some spalling, and that sort of thing, that needs to be repaired. That bridge is currently on the HDOT red list. When this project was put out to bid, we anticipated what the level effort was going to be for those repairs. Since then, the water's been lowered, and some things have deteriorated since our initial look. There's additional quantity of repairs that need to be made. And this change order is intended to address those additional quantities of work.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone? All those in favor of the motion say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

- G. MOTION:** Commissioner Shea to approve the construction contract for the 2022 Sidewalk Curb Ramps Replacement Project with William P. Davis Excavation, LLC of Hampton, NH in an amount of \$380,220. Funding will be through Department: 160 Admin/Engineering; Fund: Bond; Activity: Paving.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Dan Hudson, City Engineer. This is an approach we're trying to take where we get out and replace some of the curb ramps prior to paving. The idea there is to expedite it. Obviously when we go in and we mill a road and then we have to go and construct each of the ramps, that takes some time. So, some roads, it takes us quite a while to get to final restoration on them. So, we originally put this out to bid with a few streets that we anticipated doing advanced construction or ramp construction. Two of those streets, we ended up doing under the paving program and ended up redoing the ramps under that program. And then the other street was deferred due to gas utility work. So, this award is actually, there was only one bidder on that bid we put out. This award actually is somewhat of a revised scope, substitutes with two other streets, and is intended to rebuild the ramps on those streets in advance of paving next year.

Mayor Donchess

Questions? Comments? All those in favor of the motion - Oops, Commissioner Schoneman.

Commissioner Schoneman

I just wanted to clarify that Summer Street, Berkeley Street and Harris Road were one of them was deferred and two of them they're already done?

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Correct. Summer Street and Harris Road have been paved, done and paved. And Berkeley Street we deferred due to gas work. We didn't want multiple contractors tripping over each other

out there. We had, not knowing exactly the timing, we had carried the work in both in this bid and in the paving bid. It turned out that the paving contractor was able to complete it on the schedule that they needed to. It ended up working out. But our goal here is to get ahead of next year's work to try to expedite some of that paving work.

Commissioner Schoneman

Okay. Thank you.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

You're welcome.

Mayor Donchess

All those in favor of the motion, say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

**H. Informational:** Street Opening Permits issued for Streets in Moratorium.

Mayor Donchess

We now have item H which is an informational item street opening permits. It's in the packet. Unless there are questions, I will go onto the - oh, Commissioner Schoneman.

Commissioner Schoneman

When did we stop hearing about grade two leaks and for approval?

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

It was earlier this year. We brought forward, at Liberty's request, we brought forward a motion to basically grant them a blanket approval through the calendar year. That was subject to us reporting each month on where those occurred. There was a bit of discussion obviously about the timing of those leaks and they are required to fix them within a certain period of time. And we had some discussion about that. The granting of that approval enables them to more quickly go forth and complete the repairs. And so that was done. I don't remember exactly which month it was, but it was just earlier this year that that was approved.

Commissioner Schoneman

So, to be clear, these are streets that are in Moratorium, some paved as recently as 2022, well at least 2020. And they're being dug into to repair leaks that are not emergencies. Grade two leaks are given, what is it? 6 months to-

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

6 months within the same calendar year. If you find it early in the spring, you have 6 months. If you find it in December, you got to go out and do it immediately in December, because it has to be done within that calendar year.

Commissioner Schoneman

Right, so these are no longer approved by the Board. They're just-

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Not individually. The board at that previous meeting did grant the approval for the year subject to the reporting that you see here.

Commissioner Schoneman

On record. I don't think that was a great idea.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

Noted.

Commissioner Schoneman

Thank you.

Dan Hudson, City Engineer

You're welcome.

### **III. Street Department**

- A. MOTION:** Commissioner Moriarty to approve the purchase of asphalt and aggregates from Brox Industries of Hudson, NH and Continental Paving of Londonderry, NH in the amount of \$144,500. Funding will be through Department: 161 Streets; Fund: General; Account Classification: 61 Supplies and Materials.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

This is our annual contract. We purchase both our aggregate and paving products from Brox and Continental because of their proximity to our city. This is not for the paving program. This is for mill and fill, sidewalk work, filling potholes, that sort of thing. And I did check and Brox did hold their prices from last year. I was impressed with that.

Mayor Donchess

All those in favor of the motion, say, aye. Opposed? Motion Passes. Thank you.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

**IV. Wastewater Department**

- A. MOTION:** Commissioner Schoneman to approve the User Warrants as presented.

Mayor Donchess

Any discussion. All those in favor, say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

- B. MOTION:** Commissioner Lemen to approve change order 1 to the contract with John W. Egan Company for the Primary and Secondary Digester Coating project in the amount not to exceed \$61,400. Funding will be through Department: 169 Wastewater; Fund: Wastewater; Activity: Digester/Gas Tank Coating.

David Boucher

Thank you, Dave Boucher, Wastewater Superintendent. This is a change order to an active capital improvement project for coating at the wastewater facility. We have three items on here that are within the vicinity of the project area that we could save money on, save on mobilization cost. One of them in particular is a safety ladder that goes to the top of building that's pretty rusty. That would be recoated. Lateral pipe in our what weather facility and the rooftop tank for CSO number two, which is located at the wastewater plant right next to the digestive complex.

Three of the items on here were discovered during the sandblasting prep stage of the digester one and two coating project. The metal skirt at the bottom of the primary digest after they clean that determine that it needs a good coat. Same with the seal, the concrete around the base of the digesters, which supports the digesters, needed some repair, and determined I needed a seal coat on that as well. Also, the chain link fence, it's a safety fence around the top of our secondary digester, needed replacing that's on here as well. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone? All those in favor of the motion say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

- C. MOTION:** Commissioner Shea to approve the purchase of the Gorbel Road Ranger Fall Protection Unit from Mass Crane and Hoist Services, Inc. of

Tyngsboro, MA in the amount not to exceed \$46,202. Funding will be through Department: 169 Wastewater; Fund: Wastewater; Activity: Davit ARM Replacement.

David Boucher

Dave Boucher, Wastewater Superintendent. This is also a capital improvement project at the wastewater facility, to purchase fall protection equipment. We have several tanks throughout the facility that are over 20 feet deep we have to go into and maintain. We brought in a company that we use to inspect all our safety equipment. They test our hoist and all our safety gear, to explore different options we could use to access the tank safely. We looked at Davit ARM bases to put around the facility and purchase a Davit ARM.

Because of the age of a lot of these tanks, it was determined that in some areas, there would be some significant modifications in order for the Davit ARMS to meet the load testing on it. The better route to go is this trailer mounted, it's a Davit ARM, but it's an extended arm with some stabilizers on it that can reach over 90% of the areas we need to in our facility and can also be used at our pump stations out on the street. We put specs together. We reached out to different companies that met those specs. We could only find two in this region to get quotes from. We reached out to both of them, received the quotes and Mass Crane was the lower of the two.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

How do you reach the other 10% or less of the tank?

David Boucher

We're looking at that. Those areas tend to be on newer structures, like our wet weather facility, which isn't as aged as our tanks. So that might be an opportunity to put the Davit ARM in those, but we do have another engineering firm coming in and they're looking at the structure in that area to make sure that the concrete can support those Davit ARM bases. And we do have some of the equipment in other areas of the facility that already have Davit ARMS that are attached to, whether they're in the ground or were built into the original project.

Commissioner Shea

Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone else? All those in favor of the motion, say aye. Opposed? Motion passes. Thank you, Mr. Boucher.

**V. Parks Department**

MOTION:** Commissioner Moriarty to approve the purchase of a 2022 light structure system including LED lights for Labine Park from Musco Sports Lighting of Oskaloosa, IA in the amount of \$265,721 pursuant to the Sourcewell Contract #07619-MSL. Funding will be through Department: 177 Parks & Recreation; Fund: Trust; Account Category: 71 Equipment.

Bryan Conant

Bryan Conant, Superintendent of Parks and Rec. The current lighting infrastructure at Labine softball field is extremely dated. It's so old, the lights on it can't be adjusted anymore, which causes it to shine in players' faces, creates blind spots and a hazardous playing environment. I think this would be a great upgrade. These are going to be LED lights. I think operational costs are going to go down, and we're actually going to be able to control these remotely, which will be much more efficient. Are there any questions on this topic?

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

We had a lot of discussion recently at our Joint Committee regarding The Board of Public Works building and the direction of lighting. And to what extent they cast up. Are these lights designed in such a way that they are downward facing with kind of some amount of shielding to prevent upward glare? Can you speak to that?

Bryan Conant

They are.

Commissioner Shea

Great. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Moriarty.

Commissioner Moriarty

I just had a question, about other systems because when I drive around to other states and parks, I see them using solar panels for each light on a field. Was that not looked at or was that not available?

Bryan Conant

No, I don't think for this particular project that would be available. I think that's something that we should definitely look into. I think renewable energy is a great alternative. But I don't believe that in this case, Commissioner Moriarty, that would be an option.

Commissioner Moriarty

By the way, congratulations.

Bryan Conant

Thank you very much.

Mayor Donchess

Anyone else? All those in favor of the motion, say aye. Opposed? Motion passes.

**MOTION CARRIED:** Unanimously

Bryan Conant

Bryan Conant, Superintendent of Parks and Rec. I believe the current playground at St. Andrew's Park was probably installed sometime in the 1970's. It's pretty old and outdated. I think this installation of the playground we're proposing would enhance the park tremendously. It's got some inclusive pieces, the pieces on it are for a wide age bracket. I think this will be, this is a great project. Are there any questions?

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

Is that bongos over by the spider climber?

Bryan Conant

Yes.

Commissioner Shea

Cool. I also like the canopy over the structure. I think some, a lot of the playgrounds that don't have something like that get pretty hot up top at noon. So that's good to be mindful of that. So, thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Alderman O'Brien.

Michael B. O'Brien, Sr., Aldermanic Liaison

Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I would just add, let me just probably glom in as a resident of Ward 9, but if you remember, we do have a ball field there that is very heavily used. What does the brothers and sisters who are too young, of some of the ball players, what can they do? What's the safe environment during a game and this top pot, they actually do have an aluminum slide, but I'm of the one that would like to kind of stop that.

And I don't think we need future generations burning themselves on aluminum in this particular weather. Although I find out from my childhood, it was thrilling, but you only did it once, but this I think will enhance. And then if I'm also correct, to the director, this is the last one in the series, most of the one have been upgraded to some degree. And this one hasn't been touched in a while. And so therefore it's in sore need. So as Ward 9, I will say we would anticipate and appreciate your support of this. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Schoneman.

Commissioner Schoneman

First off, I'm completely in favor of more playgrounds. As the mother of a young child, you can never have too many. I wondered if this one doesn't have shade at all. I'm not familiar with this park. Does it have shade?

Bryan Conant

The park does there, there is a healthy stand of white pine trees. There there's a lot of shade actually in the park. So yes, to answer your question.

Commissioner Schoneman

Okay. We have a personal family preference for Roby Park because the shade sales were such a huge improvement over what it used to be. You talk about the slides getting hot, everything in that park would be hot, too hot to use. If we're upgrading the playgrounds and there isn't a lot of natural shade, I think it would be great to consider what we could do to add shade to those playgrounds. I think it would be a huge benefit to all the people who use it.

Bryan Conant

I completely agree. Yes.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Lemen.

Commissioner Lemen

I'm looking at the picture. So are there two spinners, one for-

Bryan Conant

One that's inclusive.

Commissioner Lemen

That's great. I mean, it's really nice to see spinners making comeback because for a while they were like the, you talk about thrills when you're a kid being on the spinner was, so it's really nice to see that. I think the park design looks great.

Bryan Conant

Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Commission. Moriarty.

Commissioner Moriarty

Superintendent. I noticed in your discussion you didn't list other bidders. Were there any other bidders for this?

Bryan Conant

You know, this is through Sourcewell, which is a state bid, through our other designs that we looked at, and they were all substantially more, so they did cost more.

Commissioner Moriarty

Thank you. And to add to that, because I don't recognize the company, I don't know, have we used them before in the city? I don't, the name doesn't ring a bell since I've been on the board.

Bryan Conant

I think this is the first time doing a playground install for the city. I believe after talking to the gentleman, they did the install of the splash pad over at Sandy Pond. But he has not done a playground equipment install structure,  
Mayor Donchess

Anyone else? All those in favor of the motion, say aye. Opposed? Motion Passes. Thank you very much, Mr. Conant.

Mayor Donchess

Next, we have administration informational items, the budget transfers. Unless there are questions on that we will move on to the Director's Report and call on Director Fauteux.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

The first slide, this is an installation of the grid smart cameras at Main and Otterson, electric light installed these on July 12th, and these are vehicle detection cameras, so we can better see what's going on downtown. So, these have been very helpful. They don't record but it allows the superintendent, the city engineer to view what's going on. During the last week of June our traffic department added pavement markings and signage to try to discourage the blocking of driveways along Cotton Road, by patrons of the Pressed Cafe.

If you go to the Pressed Cafe, you know exactly what I'm talking about. So hopefully that will help that problem. We received a lot of complaints.

Commissioner Schoneman

Is that the one on Spit Brook or the one on Amherst?

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Yes, Amherst.

Commissioner Schoneman

I didn't realize there are residences back there.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Sidewalk and 88 ramp data collection has been in full swing. We thought it was going to take us two years. It looks like we're going to be able to collect the data on all of our sidewalks this construction season, which will allow us to move to a transition plan. And I think our risk management department will be working on the transition plan over the winter

Commissioner Lemen

Director Fauteux, how is the data collected?

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

We have an app that our GIS person developed. And so, the engineers go out in the field and there's a whole variety of different things that they're filling in for each second stretch of sidewalk, the condition and length and all the curves and all of that. And we have two engineers who, actually Natalia, our staff engineer and our city survey, Mark Jennings has been very active. And they're doing a great job along with our engineering interns.

Commissioner Shea

Does the app have inputs for places where there's obstruction in the sidewalk by a sign or telephone pole or something like that?

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Yes. Yes.

Commissioner Shea

Excellent.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

It has all of that. Cracked sealing. This is actually a cracked sealing on the Fox Meadow Road, which was done on June 28th. And we've done about 72 roadways, about 16 and a half miles, over a three-week period. So, we've done a lot of cracked sealing.

This is a portion of sewer pipe under GW Highway that was replaced after our videoing showed there that there were some major deficiencies. This is just north of the turning circle at Pike Street.

Sunshine Paving finally paved West Hollis Street on July 6th. This shows paving, rolling, raking, and traffic control. This is curb installation on West Hollis Street. This is the Canal Street Bridge Rehabilitation that Engineer Hudson was discussing earlier.

It's being repaired as part of the rehab project and completed by New England Infrastructure of Hudson, MA. And this is again, the Canal Street Bridge Rehabilitation. The photo in the left

shows the cracked Canal Street Bridge Barrier at the Southwest sidewalk overlook. On the right, it shows the preparation for concrete repairs. This is a crew repairing sewer on Howard Street. This is mill and fill on East Pearl Street. Mill and fill on Temple.

We are repairing the wading pool at Greeley Park. Unfortunately, we had some structural problems, and it would no longer hold water. But we are repairing it and hope to have it back open within a couple of weeks. And our own street department crews are doing that work and I know that's a popular wading pool, so we're working as quickly as we can to get it back up and running.

This is a manhole structure on Tilton Street that was replaced. This is some field repair, the Parks Department fixed the infield at Murray Field. There were some low spots and some repairs.

Our opening day in DPW day was a huge success. We had thousands of residents that came through. During the day we had trucks and giveaways and lots of presentations on different public works things. We had kids putting their hands in paint and then on the plows. So it was, we had a lot of entertainment. It was a really fun day. That was June 18th.

We have finally completed the work on our four new pickleball courts of Shady Lane. There's been a lot of enthusiasm about that. Folks are really, really excited and they look great. Pickleball is really growing in our city, very popular. Congratulations to the Nashua Angels, who beat the Nashua Athletics on Monday night, June 27th, and becoming the Nashua Babe Ruth Champions with a winning score of 6 to 5. And it went into 8 innings.

We have the fairytale festival, which is this Saturday, at Greeley Park from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. This is a hugely popular event. I'll have thousands of princesses and princes with us. And all the princesses will be there. And that's always hugely popular with the kids. There'll be other entertainment too and games and other things.

We have been recoating the digester complex, we're part way through, if you went to wastewater treatment plant, you'd say it's a much nicer green color than that horrible blue color it was. So, the first coat is on. And the last thing that I wanted to - actually no, there's another thing. But the next Household Hazardous Waste Collection. It will be held on Saturday, August 6th from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. at Crown Street. I also wanted to mention last month we talked about The Gleason's and their Rambling House Dumpster.

I just wanted to give you an update on that. The Fire Marshall said absolutely not under the bridge, because he was worried of worried about fires. Economic development is working with them to put their dumpster in a parking space. I think that situation has been resolved, but I did want to give you an update because we were a little bit discouraged when the Fire Marshall said no. The other thing I just wanted to mention is that the traffic circle located near Revere, the Board of Aldermen decided to name that The Officer Edward Rocky Graziano Memorial Circle. I don't know a lot about Officer Graziano, but I do know that he was killed in line of duty, right near Haywards. And he was only 26 years old I believe and happened back in like 1964. So, that was named and so I just wanted to let you know, just in case that you hear him.

Mayor Donchess

Any questions?

Michael B. O'Brien, Sr., Aldermanic Liaison

Mr. Mayor, if I may.

Mayor Donchess

Yes.

Michael B. O'Brien, Sr., Aldermanic Liaison

To follow up with that tribute to the officer that was killed in line of duty. From what was presented in the committee, the traffic circle is within the vicinity where the accident did occur. He was a motorcycle officer for the city, and he had outstanding career and came highly recommended. So, this is a, sounds like a well-deserved tribute to a man who dedicated his life for the protection of the citizens.

Mayor Donchess

Very good.

**VII. Commissioner's Comments**

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

So, at the last meeting we touched on the West Pearl Street Reconfiguration and how it kind of came to us fully bid. And we weren't really engaged in the process. Today, we were brought information about the Franklin Street Reconfiguration, and I'm just concerned that we're not being utilized to the extent that our purpose for existing here is. And I could be wrong, but it seems to me that reconfiguration of streets and the direction of them and the alteration of them would be under our purview. So even if it were, I mean, at least with the West Pearl Street item, it was brought before us. But this was just informational and that doesn't seem correct to me. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

We do have a special meeting scheduled or we're scheduling one to come and update you on all the projects where they are to try to correct any deficiencies in that regard. Which is going to be next Thursday at 3 o'clock.

Commissioner Shea

Thank you. And then on a lighter note, so I had a constituent reach out about sidewalks and growth in the French Hill area, primarily around Chandler Street. I know that we have some, some projects coming for Lock and Whitney Street and probably some of the connecting streets between them. But as we look at the sidewalks and develop that data is growth a part of that item, like something that they are collecting data on, or I can't imagine that it is because it's such a nit-picky thing in the grand scheme of like structure of sidewalks and their functionality.

But it would be nice for us to look at repointing sidewalks, especially where they come in contact with telephone poles. That seems to be like the big thing. So, if we could develop a program to get out there with power washer or whatever implement would be best for that to get all the dirt out. And then re-pointed, I know that we've got additional Mason refocus on board now. I think especially in the downtown neighborhoods, people would appreciate if we attended to that a little more.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

That's a huge problem. And unfortunately, we don't have the staff to be able to address all of that, but it is something that we're getting a lot of calls about. It's something that we're trying to figure out. I'm not sure if we're going to need to subcontract that out or purchase a piece of equipment and it gets complicated too because some of the growths are people's really nice shrubs, we could kill them if we just go, so there needs to be some community outreach. So it's not quite as simple as just going by and mopping off branches and those sort of things.

Commissioner Shea

No. I'm thinking about grasses.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Oh, the grass in the sidewalks.

Commissioner Shea

Like curly dock weed and things like that. And it has to have some impact on the lifespan of these facilities. So, you get the cracks, the grass makes it worse.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Yes.

Commissioner Shea

In the winter you get water in there, you get frost heaving to a greater extent.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

So, once we replace the sidewalks, which there are a lot of sidewalks that need to be replaced throughout the city, that should go away to a large degree. Because you're right, a lot of that's coming up through the cracks and voids in the sidewalks that we currently have. As far as we can't spray pesticides on our sidewalks because we can't, it's too close to homes. So, it's a bit of a conundrum. It's a challenge. It's something that we can look at on case-by-case basis. I can look at Chandler and see if there's something we can do.

Commissioner Shea

Appreciate it. Thank you.

Mayor Donchess

Any other comments? Commissioner Moriarty

Commissioner Moriarty

We had some public comment today about the disk golf, which I don't think we had been updated at all as to what's going on with that project. So maybe we can have that at some point because I don't know where we are. This one public individual said that the city may not be following protocol. So of course, I'd like to know where we are.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Sure. So, there isn't an update yet. We are working with Gove Environmental. And there were some trees that were cut within the, now that's not under the jurisdiction of DES, but within the buffer, there's a 40-foot buffer. So that's something that we're going to be working with the Conservation Commission on. We haven't gone to the Conservation Commission yet because we're still developing a plan that shows all of the impacts. But as soon as we realized that that was happening, we immediately stopped.

And we worked, we did a wetlands delineation and we have developed a plan that shows current impacts and future impacts. And you can cut within the buffer, it's not that you can't cut within the buffer. It's just, you have to have a conversation with the Conservation Commission about it.

And again, the reason I haven't given the board an update is because we don't really know at this point. There may have been a couple of very minor impacts, that would be under the jurisdiction of DES, which I really don't have any information on at this point. I'm not certain. But the email from DES said very minor impacts. Gove is our wetland scientist that we hired, we stopped, we halted, we haven't done anything else. We're waiting until all of that's in place,

we're waiting until we meet with the Conservation Commission so that they can give us further direction. And then we'll start construction again.

But there was one place where they crossed the brook with a piece of equipment, which should not have happened. What should have happened was there should have been some sort of planking or something put down before it was crossed. But again, it wasn't done maliciously in any way. And once we realized that that had happened, we immediately stopped and said, okay, let's stop. Let's hire wetland scientists. Let's delineate everything. That's what we're working on now. But as soon as I know more, I'll certainly give the Board an update.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Shea.

Commissioner Shea

I've looked at the wetland maps and is it correct that we are not in the wetlands? Like we are not building any sort of course items within the wetlands that are established. I've looked at both the concept and then the wetland zones. And it seems so, I don't know. I just wanted to confirm that that's the case.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

So, there are wetlands that are under the jurisdiction of DES, which are, you know, the major wetlands. This is not, this is under the jurisdiction of our own conservation commission. DES has jurisdiction when you start cutting within, if you're right in the water, other than that, it's our Conservation Commission that has. Now out of that 40-foot buffer, but then, there's no concern.

We can pretty much do what we want. If you walk out there it looks very good. There has been erosion control measures put in place. We haven't been out there for a while. It's been maybe a couple of months now, since we've been out there, because we've been working with Gove Environmental, and city engineers are working on a very detailed plan. That shows everything should, from where the tea pads will go, where the holes will be, what other trees will need to be cut, where the current impacts, where they'll be crossings over wetlands and all of that. We will be making sure that everything's done according to the guidance of the Conservation Commission, moving forward, we just haven't gotten to that point yet.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Lemen.

Commissioner Lemen

I just wanted to express my appreciation for the work that the Board is doing, your department is doing with the homeless, because it has really made the lives of the people who do outreach at the soup kitchen a lot better. I mean, you've been really sensitive. I could not believe it when Matt whipped out his phone to show us this, what he called the most pristine homeless encampment he had ever seen where the people had policed or own area. They had a tent that

was perfect. They even had two bottles of spray cleaner, like around. So, you've been really helpful and the porta potties are going to help a lot I think.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Great. We're proud to be part of that team.

Commissioner Lemen

Well, everybody's been really, really, really nice to the people. So, we're, I mean, our outreach workers are having a lot more success with dealing with people.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

That's great. I'm happy to hear that.

Mayor Donchess

Commissioner Schoneman

Commissioner Schoneman

In regards to the disc golf, I think that, where we are now, going back and talking to environmental groups and Conservation Commission, and stopping the work, developing a plan that shows where all the tees are and where other crossings are. Doing that now, I think highlights what Mrs. Ortolano was speaking about. And I have to agree that this went forward in a way that was premature.

I'm not against disc golf at all. But to go in and start ripping up trees in a manner that, in the way that this was done, I think was unfortunate. And I think it could have been a much more community approved community involved project. If we had waited and done all of this work ahead of time. I don't think it particularly makes our department look good. To go ahead and do all this stuff and then say, oh wait, yes, okay, we should go back and do all these other things. It's unfortunate. And I do look forward to having some activities that are great for the city. And I'm glad that there are so many in our city who are passionate about it. And I think that it's right, that we should be in dialogue about it.

I also want to commend the city. I don't know if everybody knows about the fact that the city puts on swim lessons for kids every summer for two weeks. It's a half hour lesson Monday through Friday for two weeks, for 20 bucks. It's the best deal in town. And my son is finishing up his second week. He loves it. We've met a lot of people, our neighbors, some of our neighbors, some of them aren't, it's just been a really great program.

Mayor Donchess

And which pool does he go to?

Commissioner Schoneman

Centennial. Yes. But I am, I know other moms who have been at the other pools, and all have said that it's the best deal going. So good job guys. It's great.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

Thank you for mentioning that, because boy, we really have struggled to find enough guards this year to be able to even staff the pools, let alone do swim lessons. It's a real tribute to Lauren Byers and Jeff DeSalvo for working as hard as they did to make sure that our pools were fully staffed, and we were able to open them. Some communities were not as fortunate, you know, Concord couldn't open a couple of their pools because they just couldn't find guards. And those young people work really hard.

Commissioner Schoneman

It's not an easy job.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

It's not an easy job. And some of them are young, you know, some of them are 15 and 16 years old. So, we really appreciate their efforts and that they have chosen to work for the city.

Commissioner Schoneman

I've really seen my son's confidence grow in his swimming. It's great.

Lisa Fauteux, Director, Division of Public Works

That's awesome.

Commissioner Schoneman

Yes, they did a good job.

Mayor Donchess

Any other comments? Our new City Clerk, I don't know if you've had a chance to meet yet.

Commissioner Shea

Does our new city clerk have a name?

Commissioner Schoneman

I didn't know we had a new City Clerk.

Mayor Donchess

Why don't you introduce yourself and just tell the Board a little about yourself since you're here.

Daniel Healey

Hi everyone. My name's Dan Healey. I'm the new City Clerk. I came to you from Derry, where I was Town Clerk 6 years. So, I just started here Wednesday, so it's my second day, just came to see, I was watching a little of this meeting, so I just came to see the end of this meeting. I'm currently right now, Second Vice President of the Town and City Clerks Association. So, in two years I should be President of that Association. And I'm on a few other Town and City Clerk Boards, Certification Committee, Legislative Committee. So, it's nice to meet all of you.

Commissioner Lemen

I have a question. So, for years I've been a poll worker. That's not going to be prevented by me being on the Board of Public Works, right? As long as I'm not running.

Daniel Healey

As long as you're not on the ballot, I don't see any issues.

Commissioner Lemen

Okay. Because I know they have a hard time getting people.
