



ORDINANCE

ESTABLISHING A 15-MINUTE PARKING ZONE ON A PORTION OF AMHERST STREET

CITY OF NASHUA

In the Year Two Thousand and Eleven

The City of Nashua ordains that Part II “General Legislation”, Chapter 320 “Vehicles and Traffic”, Article X “Parking Time Limits in Non-Parking Lot Areas”, of the Nashua Revised Ordinances, as amended, hereby be further amended as follows:

1. In Section 320-35 “Fifteen-minute parking”, add the following new underlined language in the appropriate alphabetical order:

“§ 320-35. Fifteen-minute parking.

A. No vehicle shall be stationed or remain for a period exceeding 15 minutes on the following streets:

Name of Street	Side	Location
<u>Amherst Street</u>	<u>South</u>	<u>From a point 25 feet west from the west line of Beacon Street westerly a distance of 18 feet”</u>

2. In Section 320-36 “Thirty-minute parking”, delete the struck-through language and add the new underlined language as follows:

“§ 320-36. Thirty-minute parking.

No vehicle shall be stationed or remain for a period exceeding 30 minutes on the following streets:

Name of Street	Side	Hours	Location

Amherst Street	South	All	From Beacon Street for 200 feet west <u>Beginning at a point 43 feet west of Beacon Street and extending to a point 200 feet west of Beacon Street”</u>

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall become effective at the time of removal and/or installation of the necessary sign(s).
