



ORDINANCE

EXTENDING THE OVERNIGHT ON-STREET PARKING PERMIT PROGRAM FOR ANOTHER YEAR

CITY OF NASHUA

In the Year Two Thousand and Fourteen

The City of Nashua ordains that Part II “General Legislation”, Chapter 320 “Vehicles and Traffic”, Article XIII “Night Parking”, Section 320-78.1 “Overnight on-street parking pilot program in designated downtown area” of the Nashua Revised Ordinances, as amended, be and hereby is further amended by deleting the struck-through language and adding the new underlined language as follows:

“320-78.1. Overnight on-street parking pilot program in designated downtown area.

There shall be a pilot program for on-street overnight parking as described below.

A. This pilot program shall expire December 31, 201415, ~~which shall also conclude the first licensing period, unless~~ reauthorized. The judgment regarding the success of the pilot program shall include, but not be limited to, the following factors:

1. the number of residents who obtain permits;
2. a favorable recommendation from the Police Department;
3. a favorable recommendation from the Fire Department; and
4. a favorable recommendation from the Public Works Division.

B. On-street overnight parking shall...

...

5. Regardless of when ~~the a~~ permit is obtained, the annual parking permits shall be effective to December 31, 2014 of that year, and the fee for every permit for a year or a portion of a year shall be \$10.00.”

This ordinance shall become effective upon passage.
